Characteristics and uses.--The tree, with its pyramidal head and the branches, terminating in large panicles of gold-colored flowers, adds not a little to the appearance of the gardens in Madras during the months of November and December, and while it grows to a moderate size in Madras (from 0 to 25 feet in height, and from 0 to 3 feet in girth) it is said to attain a larger size in the Burman country; and according to Captain Dance's Report, logs having a maximum girth of 4 cubits and 30 feet in length are procurable. The leaves are equally pinnated with 5 to 10 pairs...
