Variously the director of the Edinburgh Festival Fringe, Scottish Television, and BritainsDNA, as well as a former student-elected rector of the University of St. Andrews, Alistair Moffat was born and bred in the region known as the Scottish Borders. Here he gives us a fresh and vivid account of one of the most famous battles ever fought in that region, the 1314 Battle of Bannockburn. As 8,000 Scottish soldiers, most of them spearmen, faced 18,000 English infantrymen, archers, and mounted knights, many would have assumed a foregone conclusion. But after two days' fighting, Robert the Bruce had routed Edward II's forces, enabling Scotland to retain its independence. In addition to setting the battle within its historical and political context, Moffat captures all the fear, heroism, confusion, and desperation of the fighting itself as he describes the tactics and maneuvers that led to Scottish victory. The result is a human picture of Bannockburn that re-creates the experience not only of the leaders but also of the ordinary men who fought to the death on both sides." Moffat's account of the mustering of the English army and its march north is splendid. He is...
